The Gordejuela Inspection, 1600 (Monterrey, 1600)

María, native of Tepeaca, daughter of Don Joseph, unmarried, servant of Juan López. She brought a young daughter named Mariana.

Catalina, sister of the above-mentioned woman, unmarried, who is in the service of the said Juan López and is taking along a girl named María. Agustina, sister of the above, married to Francisco, servant of the said Juan López. (Monterrey, 1600)

The following family relationships are based on the above quote – Stanley A Lucero

- Three daughters of Don Joseph: Maria [native of Tepeaca]; Catalina; & Agustina. All three daughters are servants of Juan Lopez.
- Mariana, daughter of Maria, grand daughter of Don Joseph
- Maria, girl who came with Catalina
- Agustina, married to Francisco

MARIA, india accompanying servants with Juan Lopez (1953:559) (Snow, 1996, p. 28)

MARIANA, india, daughter of Maria, servant with Juan Lopez (1953:559) (Snow, 1996, p. 28)

Notes for Loyal Colonists (Snow, 1996)

5. *JUAN LOPEZ HOLGUIN, identified as the son of Juan Lopez Villasana and Catalina de Villanueva, during the 1600 muster and inspection, had two sisters, Anna and Maria Ortiz, also listed there. Chavez, as noted, has somehow credited Juan with marriage to his mother, and did not refer to the two sisters. It would appear, from this, that the wife of Simon de Abendano (Chavez 1992:1), identified as Maria Ortiz, was not the daughter of Cristobal Baca (Maria de Villarubia, daughter of Vaca and Anna Ortiz). The ramifications of Chavez' error should be considered under his discussions of Carvajal, Holguin, Baca, and other seventeenth-century families. (Snow, 1996, p. 85)*

NOTE: Map 38. Mexico (Snow, 1996, p. 131) shows Tepeaca southeast of Tlascala near Puebla de los Angeles. The states of Mexico are not identified on this map and it has no scale of miles.

Three Tlascaltea[a] sisters

“. . . **there are three Tlascaltec[a] sisters** who stand out above the rest for being the **daughters of a Don Joseph of Tepeaca**. They were brought along [in 1600 to New Mexico] by Juan López [Olguín Villasana [Villa Sana], (Spanish, ca. 1558, Fuente Ovejuna, Cordova, Spain-1626)]. One was **Maria**, unmarried with a little daughter Mariana; the other was **Catalina**, unmarried, **Augustina**, married to the Indian Francisco, also a servant of Juan Lopez.” (Fray Angelico Chavez, “Pohe-yemo’s Representatives,” *New Mexico Historical Review*, April 1967:95-97.); Quoted in Joe Sando, *Pueblo Indian Biographies* University of New Mexico, College of Education, 1964:13.
